- Hot Tip: It is helpful to ask your local municipal government to request data from other government organizations. It will help expedite the process.

- How is this data useful and how can it be improved

- On the map helpful tool for neighborhoods
- We should include an indicator on rent per square foot. Is this possible? Yes, we can research Costar and find this information. We could incorporate into next iteration of the neighborhood data profiles.
- It is helpful for neighborhood business districts to add to their website or have on hand, basic demographic information for their neighborhood and important statistics for businesses when thinking about starting a business in, relocating to or expanding to a neighborhood.
- It is also helpful to see police crime statistics
